

My Dear Trinity Lutheran Church,

I came across this little citation by the author and psychotherapist, Francis Ward Weller. It helped me get through some things in my life and I thought it might be of some help to some of you as we try to discern how to be God's people in this current time of uncertainty and strife. I think now is as good a time as ever to reflect on Grief and Gratitude.

Francis Weller wrote: "The work of a mature person is to carry grief in one hand and gratitude in the other and to be stretched large by them. How much sorrow can I hold? That's how much gratitude I can give. If I carry only grief, I'll bend toward cynicism and despair. If I only have gratitude, I'll become saccharine and won't develop much compassion for people's suffering. Grief keeps the heart fluid and soft, which makes compassion possible."

These words strike me as being very realistic and theologically sound. Everyone experiences grief during their lives. Some more than others and some experience far too much grief for any one person to bear. Some of you may have lost a job. Some of you may have lost a loved one and that grief is heavy on your heart. Grief can intensify our sense of differences. We compare losses and judge others. "My loss is greater than your loss." Or "My grief makes me a victim and I should receive payback for my suffering."




Grief doesn't have to lead to cynicism and distrust of others. Grief is part of our common humanity. No one escapes this life without some pain and loss. Theologians speak of the theology of the cross. The cross shows us Jesus intimately knew pain and loss. Jesus wept when his friend Lazarus died. Jesus experienced betrayal by his best friends. Jesus felt the sting of the whip and the crown of thorns thrust down upon his head. The writer of Hebrews says of Jesus, <u>"For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses."</u>

The theology of the cross speaks honestly of the realities of sin and brokenness in our world. This sin and brokenness are not only experienced on the individual level but also on the systemic level. "We know that the whole creation has been groaning in labor pains until now."

The Hebrews text speaks of the compassion of God. God is moved by human suffering. God is with the children of Israel when they were in slavery in Egypt. The suffering of the Hebrews as slaves in Egypt was not meant to be interpreted only as a painful memory. Because of the experience of slavery and the experience of God's compassion and redemption, the Hebrews were charged to show compassion to others. In fact, that was the command to Abraham when God promised to bless him with many descendants. His legacy was that he was blessed in order to be a blessing to the nations of the world.

Grief rightfully dealt with can lead to compassion rather than the lethargy of bitterness and despair. Gratitude rightfully expressed can bear us up during times of grief and empower us to show compassion to others. Being thankful for finding a new patch of raspberries doesn't have to mean you don't care about what's going on in Ukraine or the Middle East. Enjoying a good hearty meal on Thanksgiving doesn't have to mean you're neglectful of those who are hungry.

As we begin to plan for the holiday season, eat, drink, be merry, but be grateful. Remember the source of all good things. The Lord God has given you blessings so that you might bless others. And yes, God can even redeem the things in life that grieve you and God can and will use you to be a blessing to others. Thomas Merton wrote of a Christian's capacity to be a "wounded healer." May that be said of us all in the days ahead as we balance genuine grief with compassionate gratitude!

Breast Cancer Awareness Month

While I sat contemplating what topic I wanted to write on this month, it dawned on me that this is Breast cancer awareness month. While going out to lunch with some other women from Trinity- one topic that was talked about was cancer. I think we all know someone that has had cancer, or maybe you yourself has had cancer. Although there are numerous cancers- this article will focus on breast cancer.

The month is about more than pink ribbons. While some feel inspired, many people living with breast cancer feel like the month overlooks their experience with the disease.

Breast Cancer Awareness month began in 1985 as a week-long awareness campaign by the American Cancer Society, in partnership with Imperial Chemical Industries, a British company that made tamoxifen. The campaign eventually grew into a month-long event. Breast Cancer Awareness Month is an international health campaign that's held every October. The month aims to promote screening and prevention of the disease, which affects 2.3 million women worldwide. Known best for its pink theme color, the month features a number of campaigns and programs —supporting people diagnosed with breast cancer, including those with metastatic breast cancer educating people about breast cancer risk factors encouraging women to go for regular breast cancer screening starting at age 40 or earlier, depending on personal breast cancer risk fundraising for breast cancer research

Breast Cancer Awareness Month can mean different things to different people. For some, it's a trigger — 31 days in the fall of pink-ribbon reminders of a disease that forever changed them. For others, it's a chance to show their support for the more than 2 million women around the world who are diagnosed with the disease each year.

U.S. breast cancer statistics

People of every country, race, ethnic group, and income level are affected by breast cancer. In the U.S., the percentage of women diagnosed with breast cancer has been slowly rising for the past couple of decades.

A woman in the U.S. today has a 1 in 8 chance of developing breast cancer over her lifetime and a 1 in 39 chance of dying from breast cancer.

Nearly 30% of women diagnosed with early-stage breast cancer later develop metastatic breast cancer. U.S. men make up 1 of every 100 breast cancer diagnoses in the country.

There are about 4 million breast cancer survivors in the U.S., including women receiving breast cancer treatment. While the percentage of women dying from breast cancer has gone down in recent decades, Black women remain more likely to die from breast cancer than women of any other racial or ethnic group.

How can you help?

If you know someone who is living with breast cancer or has been affected by the disease, check in with them to ask them how they're doing.

Schedule your annual mammogram. Encourage your friends and family to do the same.

PJ is collecting money to put together chemo care packages which will be donated to the Greenville Cancer Center- Feel free to ask her for more information.
